Rarely appearing in southern Utah, Navajo Pianist Connor Chee will perform three full length solo recitals of classical works for piano as well as original compositions and transcriptions based on traditional Navajo chants from his recent recording, *The Navajo Piano*, plus new works expressing the Navajo Creation Story from his just released CD titled, *Emergence*.

At age 12, Connor Chee won gold in the World Piano Competition's Young Artist Division, earning his first performance at New York City's Carnegie Hall, then winning multiple awards in the World Piano Competition. Chee received his Bachelor of Music from Eastman in 2009, and a master's degree from the University of Cincinnati's College Conservatory of Music. He was awarded First Prize in the 2016 Bradshaw & Buono International Piano Competition, and performed in the winners' recital at Carnegie Hall, also receiving "Best Instrumental Recording" at the 16th Annual

Native American Music Awards for his album *The Navajo Piano*, nominated for "Best New Artist" and "Record of the Year."

Residing in Phoenix, Arizona, Connor Chee is a voting member of The Recording Academy (the GRAMMY® Awards), and performs throughout the United States.

Enhancing the Native American cultural experience offered through these recitals, members of the **Kaibab Band of Paiute Indians** will speak about the Southern Paiute People who have lived in the region from time immemorial, and will present an interactive cultural circle dance, also known as a friendship dance, that encourages audience participation. Most Native American Tribal cultures have a round dance to welcome everyone in a social expression of kinship, joy, happiness, gratitude, friendship, togetherness, goodwill and harmony.

Environmental Singer Songwriter Rex Seabury "Utah Slim" expresses the healing power of the natural world, his passion for environmental justice and humanity's deep connection with nature. NLP practitioner and educator, Christiane Turner delivers the 2018 Invocation to Sustainability followed by guided meditative reflection. Kane County Chapter of the Utah Poetry Society, Willow Wind Poets interpret their uniquely personal experiences.

Interconnected with many social, economic and environmental crises facing humanity, Climate Change is emerging as a central issue of our time. Climate Reality Leader and Park City, Utah, Environmental Sustainability Manager Luke Cartin shares how the Climate Reality Project has inspired millions of citizen activists in countries across the globe to learn and work to find solutions that fit their communities. As keynote speaker, Luke will suggest responses to the state of Utah's shifting climate.

Ecological Projects Director for the Foundation for Deep Ecology, George Wuerthner, will offer perspective on sustainability from his experience as an environmental researcher and writer who has published thirty-eight books on natural and conservation history, ecology, wilderness and environmental issues. https://islandpress.org/books/foundation-deep-ecology

Park City, Utah, has stepped up to make North America's most ambitious climate goals: to be net-zero carbon and run on 100% renewable electricity for city operations by 2022, and for the whole community by 2032. In March 2017, Park City's mayor, over half of City Council, city manager, and environmental sustainability team became certified with The Climate Reality's Leadership Corps. While there, the Park City sustainability team received special recognition from former vice-president Al Gore for their bold municipal goals and actions to tackle climate change. http://www.parkcity.org/departments/sustainability/environmental-sustainability

Drought, insect damage, wildfire, downpours and flooding are occurring with greater frequency in the high desert regions of the Intermountain West. Utah forms the heart of this region. What other trends are likely to manifest across the Colorado Plateau in a steadily warming world?

The Plateau is home to an astonishing number of National and State Parks, National Forests and Monuments, Wilderness areas, National Historic and Scenic Trails and Districts of Public Land with world-class cultural, wildlife, geophysical and recreational resources. What impacts might America's federally managed estate likely anticipate for animal and plant species, timber and rangelands, water resources, recreation and rural economies? What would a proactive response look like for Utah?

Description: Ecologist, wilderness activist and author George Wuerthner offers a historical overview of the wilderness movement and its key proponents like John Muir, Aldo Leopold and Bob Marshall. Learn the main points of the 1964 Wilderness Act, what activities are and are not permitted in designated wilderness, the many threats to wilderness and why more of America's public land should be preserved as wilderness.

A wildlands explorer extraordinaire, having hiked and paddled in more than 400 designated Wilderness areas and more than 180 national park units, George has held many positions in the field of conservation, including Ecological Projects Director for the Foundation for Deep Ecology and Tompkins Conservation, a river ranger in Alaska, backcountry ranger in the Gates of the Arctic NP Alaska, botanist for BLM in Idaho and university instructor.

A well-known writer on conservation issues, George has published innumerable articles, essays, and opinion pieces. Among his 38 books are: Protecting the Wild: Parks and Wilderness Foundation for Conservation; Keeping the Wild: Against the Domestication of the Earth; Wildfire: A Century of Failed Forest Policy; Montana's Magnificent Wilderness; Nevada Mountain Ranges; Grand Canyon: A Visitor's Companion and Alaska Mountain Ranges.

Canis Lupis Colorado - Ghosts are stirring in Colorado's high country. Guardians of a delicate balance, they haunt the trees, the water, the animals - the very fabric of the land. Gray wolves shaped this place for eons only to disappear nearly overnight. This is the story of the past, present, and future of Colorado's now extinct native wolf population. We're at a tipping point: The future of our public wildlands, and the health of vast ecosystems are at stake, and the choice is up to us.

Nobody Dies in Longbearyen - They say that when you're hit by the polar bug, you never leave. Don't say we didn't warn you. Travel to the northernmost city in the world to find out why nobody dies in Longyearbyen, or so goes the rumor. But, there is something deadly, long buried in the permafrost. Lost in Light - Exactly how does light pollution affect our view of the night skies? This piece shows how much the night sky view improves as you move away from city lights.

Wildlife and the Wall – Explore the heart of the Big Bend, last true wilderness in Texas, to learn what effects building a border wall might have on wildlife dispersal, migratory corridors and access to the Rio Grande, the only water source in this harsh desert environment.

One Hundred Thousand Beating Hearts – Hear the riveting story of fourth generation cattleman Will Harris, whose evolution from industrial commodity cowboy to sustainable, humane food producer while breathing new life into his community, has been left behind and forgotten by the unrelenting sweep of agribusiness.

Growing Change - Jim Cochran walked into his strawberry fields sprayed with pesticide as the sun rose. His eyes watered, his head spun and he started to shake. From this experience, Jim helped invent the organic strawberry industry, pioneering and profiting from a healthier crop. Then he turned his attention to the health of his workers.

Straws - Used once and tossed, billions of plastic straws wind up in landfills and streets, finding their way to oceans. Actor/Director Tim Robbins narrates the history and story of Straws - and marine researchers, citizen activists, and business owners discuss how it's possible to create a sea of change, one straw at a time.
