

Slickrock String Band and Friends - Doug and Terry Griffin are the The Slickrock String Band. They've been playing music together for over 30 years in a variety of styles. But their first love is authentic Old-Time Appalachian fiddle/banjo duets and ballads, a music steeped in early American and old world traditions. In recent years they have branched into more contemporary folk music including Terry's original songs. In this program Doug playing banjo and Terry on Autoharp and fiddle, will offer a delightful mix of upbeat traditional and contemporary music.

Otter Creek – Peter and Mary Danzig, hail from Salt Lake City, and perform a spellbinding mix of original Utah and American roots music. Known for their versatility in style and instrumentation as well as their tight vocal harmonies, these two are extraordinarily gifted and perfectly matched.

An award winning songwriter and accomplished instrumentalist on the mandolin, fiddle, guitar, mountain dulcimer, banjo, and viola, Peter won the "Better World Category" of the New Songs Showcase at the Walnut Valley Festival in Winfield, KS in 2010. He was selected as a finalist in the Susanne Millsaps Performing Songwriter Showcase in 2009 and 2010, and in 2010, won 2nd place on both fiddle and mandolin at the Utah State Instrument Championships.

The Deseret News has described Mary's playing as having "electrifying energy... style and panache. "Mary has a Master of Music degree in violin performance and placed in the top three for the past four years at the Utah State Instrument Fiddling Championship. Otter Creek's songs are deeply informed from the folk tradition, exploring the experience of humanity from a refreshing and challenging perspective.

Doug Keller - Currently the Cowboy Poet Laureate of Kane County, Doug Keller grew up on a ranch near Zion Canyon in southern Utah and for several years owned a dude string near the Grand Canyon. He has written Cowboy Poetry for 35 years and is a Silver Buckle winner at the Western Legends Round-Up. Doug participates in Cowboy gatherings all over the West, and has written, directed and produced melodramas at the Old Barn Playhouse and at the Crescent Moon Theater in Kanab.

Kenny Hall - One of the premiere Cowboy Song and Western Folk Life performers in the Intermountain area, Kenny Hall's artistry and character is clearly reflected in his music: direct, uncontrived, and honest. A native son of Utah, whose great, great, grandparents came west with Brigham Young, his life and career is centered in the small town of Cannonville, Utah, where he lives with his wife Jean.

Vice President of the Cowboy Poets of Utah, Kenny performs regularly in venues such as Western Legends in Kanab, the National Cowboy Poetry gathering in Elko, NV, Butch Cassidy Days in Beaver County, UT, Everett Ruess Days in Escalante, UT, and many others. His artistic talent includes creating exceptionally beautiful, well-crafted custom saddles, hand-made chaps and gear, and award-winning camp wagons. A former PRCA bull rider, Kenny's goal is to "...pass on and keep alive this heritage and way of life that has been handed down to me by my family and those gone before me."

Linda Ghidossi-DeLuca earned Bachelor and Masters Degrees from The Juilliard School, has performed with Yo-Yo Ma; as principal violist and soloist, appeared with three San Francisco Bay Area orchestras; recorded music for films, including Mars Attacks, Predator II, Soap Dish, Cop And A Half, and others; recorded a remake of the Star Wars Themes conducted by John Williams at Skywalker Sound Stage in Marin County, California; and toured in the USA and Canada with the Dixie Chicks in 2003, as a member of a string quartet.

Joel Rosenberg is a graduate of The Juilliard School in New York City. Mr. Rosenberg has received the Individual Artist Grant from the Utah Arts Council, and a Fulbright Grant to Italy, where he studied at the Santa Cecilia Conservatory in Rome, and the Accademia Musicale Chigiana in Siena.

He has conducted the Australian Ballet with the Elizabethan Philharmonic and the Orchestra of Victoria at the Sydney Opera House, as well as the New Zealand Opera in Auckland, the Utah Opera, Ballet West with the Utah, Phoenix and Portland Symphony Orchestras, the San Francisco Ballet and the New Mexico Symphony, the Erik Hawkins Dance Company, and has appeared in concerto performances with pianist, Leon Fleisher.

Presently, Mr. Rosenberg conducts the American West Symphony and the Paradigm Chamber Orchestra in Salt Lake City.

NATIVE PLANT DISCOVERY WALK ON THE COTTONWOOD CANYON TRAIL

Date: Tuesday, May 17, 2011 Time: 6:30 to 8:00 PM

Location: Gather at the Earthfest Information Table, Kane County Office of Tourism, 78 South 100 East, Kanab. Carpool or caravan to the trailhead. From Kanab, go south on US 89A, turn west onto Kanab Creek Drive and foliow it 1.5 miles through the Ranchos. Turn right onto Stansfield Drive. Trailhead is at the top of the hill near the water tank, beyond the dip.

Description: A delightful evening stroll to observe colorful spring wildflowers along BLM's new Cottonwood Canyon Trail. We'll explore native plants in blossom until dusk over about 2 miles of trail, depending on flowering conditions and the number of questions from participants. Be prepared for up and down hiking over loose rock and clay, through Moenkopi, Chinle, and Moenave sandstone. Bring water, and sunscreen, wear sturdy shoes, and carry a walking stick.

CASTO CANYON TRAILHEAD TO PETERSON POINT ATV RIDE

Location: Go directly on your own to the Casto Canyon Trailhead, 3 miles North along a graded gravel road off US HWY 12, Two miles East of the junction of US Highways 12 & 89, a distance of 61 miles from Kanab (on the way to Bryce

Canvon National Park).

Description: Guided ATV Ride of approx. 8.2 miles. NOTE: THE CASTO CANYON TRAIL ONLY ALLOWS FOR VEHICLES 50" OR LESS, MAXIMUM OF 20 VEHICLES PER GROUP. Starting at the Casto Canyon Trailhead, participants will travel northeast up the motorized portion of the Casto Canyon Trail [3.6 miles], then north up the Barney Cove Trail [1.9 miles], then west on Road 697 to Peterson Point [2.7 miles] overlooking Red Canyon to the south and Panguitch to the west and north. There will be stops along the course to provide information to participants. The return trip will be guided for those returning to the Casto Canyon Trailhead. A DIXIE WILDERNESS IN RED CANYON

Location: Gather at Jakey Leigh's Café, 4 East Center St., Kanab, Utah for wilderness orientation over breakfast and coffee with UEC's Bob Brister and Kevin Mueller. Then carpool, or go directly on your own to the Red Canyon Visitor Center on US HWY 12, 3.2 miles east of the junction of US Highways 12 & 89, a distance of 62 miles from Kanab (on the way to Bryce Canyon National Park).

Description: The event begins with great coffee and breakfast at Jakey Leigh's Cafe, and a brief orientation on National Forest lands in Utah that qualify for wilderness designation. After the breakfast orientation and travel to the trailhead, enjoy a hike of 3 to 6 miles through a landscape of extraordinary beauty on the west side of the Paunsaugunt Plateau in the Dixie National Forest. This exquisite area of the Sunset Cliffs is being proposed for wilderness designation and is also the site for a proposed electrical transmission corridor that would cut the wilderness in half. Learn how the proposed electrical transmission corridor will impact the region. Dress accordingly for varied terrain and weather, bring plenty of water, and pack a lunch.

Topic: Multiple Uses of Public Lands

Over 100,000 oil and gas wells have already been drilled from Montana to New Mexico, and plans are underway to drill another 100,000, threatening some of America's last, best wild lands. Ranchers and hunters on the land for generations decry the dramatic changes to the landscape.

Addicted To Plastic

Topic: Modern Materials

From Styrofoam cups to artificial organs, plastics are the most ubiquitous and versatile material ever invented. Three years of filming in 12 countries on five continents, to the middle of the Pacific Ocean, plastic debris is accumulating. The film provides a wealth of practical and cutting edge solutions to recycling, toxicity and biodegradability. These solutions — which include plastic made from plants – offer viewers a hopeful perspective about our future with plastics.

The End Of The Line

Topic: Ocean Resource Depletion

Beyond the surface of the seas lies a troubling truth: an ocean increasingly empty of fish, destroyed by decades of over-exploitation. The tragic collapse of the cod fishery in Newfoundiand in the 1990s, the imminent extinction of blue fin tuna, and the devastation wreaked by illegal catches and surpassed fishing quotas, this film uncovers the dark ecological story behind our love affair with fish as food. Unless we demand political action from governments, responsible menu selections, and change our consumption habits, we could see the end of wild fish by mid-century. The first full-length, high-definition documentary film ever made about legendary environmentalist Aldo Leopold, Green Fire highlights Leopold's extraordinary career, tracing how he shaped and influenced the modern environmental movement. Leopold remains relevant today, inspiring projects all over the country that connect people and land. The film demonstrates in engaging fashion how Leopold's ideas developed over the course of time.
