Topic: Outdoor Adventure

Filmmaker/photographer Pete McBride and writer Kevin Fedarko set out on a 750-mile hike through the entire length of the Grand Canyon. More people have stood on the moon than have completed a continuous through hike of the Canyon! Witness their story of extreme physical hardship that stretches the bonds of friendship and a meditation on the timeless beauty of this sacred place. It is an urgent warning about the environmental dangers that are placing one of America's greatest monuments in peril and a cautionary tale for our complex relationship with the natural world.

Topic: Civic Participation – Portrait of an activist

Profiles the inspiring work of toxicologist, author, and activist Dr. Riki Ott, who organized Gulf coast communities in their struggle to recover from the BP Deepwater Horizon disaster. As a lecturer and activist, she is spearheading a campaign called **Ultimate Civics**, a complete civics curriculum she developed that empowers students to participate in their democracy. Recognizing the power of money in politics she advocates for a constitutional amendment to end corporate personhood, and to reform campaign finance laws, inspiring students from fifth grade through universities and adults to take action and showing by example how one person can make a difference.

Topic: Nuclear Disarmament – Portrait of an activist

An intimate portrait of Setsuko Thurlow, a passionate, 85-year-old nuclear disarmament activist and survivor of the atomic bomb in Hiroshima. Her moving story is told through the lens of her friendship with a second generation survivor, Mitchie Takeuchi. At age 13, Setsuko was miraculously pulled out of a fiery building after the bomb was dropped and unable to save her other 27 classmates who were burned to death alive. That experience shaped her life forever and she endeavored to keep a pledge she made to her friends – that no one should ever again experience that horrible fate.

This timely exploration of the global dangers of nuclear weapons provides an insider's perspective as we see Setsuko campaign with ICAN (the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons), and witness her acceptance speech at the 2017 Nobel Peace Awards. 2020 marked the 75th anniversary of the bombing of Hiroshima.

Topic: Landscape Architecture – Portrait of a pioneering female garden designer

Join award-winning public garden designer Lynden B. Miller as she sets off to explore the remarkable life and work of America's first female landscape architect, Beatrix Farrand. Farrand was responsible for some of the most celebrated gardens in the United States and helped create a distinctive American voice in landscape architecture.

Although Beatrix created gardens for the rich and powerful, including John D. Rockefeller, Jr., J.P. Morgan, and President Woodrow Wilson, she also was an early advocate for the value of public gardens and believed strongly in the power of the natural world to make people's lives better. Her extraordinarily creative vision brought about such treasured outdoor spaces as Dumbarton Oaks and the Carriage Trail system at Acadia National Park.

Sandstone Wonderland: The History of Utah's National Parks and Monuments

We'll meet a diverse and intriguing group of explorers, scientists, artists and writers who brought these masterpieces of sculptured rock to the attention of the outside world and called for their protection as part of our national park system. Come along as we ride through unknown canyons, scale lofty mesas and motor down dusty roads to discover what these early-day travelers encountered in the mysterious landscapes of the Colorado Plateau.

He is a fellow of the International League of Conservation Writers and recipient of the Wallace Stegner Prize in Environmental Humanities.

Tutored by the Land: a Writing Workshop with Stephen Trimble

In this workshop, Steve will take us through the basics of creative non-fiction. He'll describe the combination of journaling, research, and interviews that leads to rich content. And he'll emphasize the key elements of strong writing and self-editing. As writing teacher Paula LaRocque says, his goal is to

make your writing “clear, brief, precise, purposeful, warm, and interesting.” Participants will engage a couple brief writing exercises and have an opportunity to share their words with fellow writers in the workshop, as well as leave the workshop with additional prompts to keep you writing.

Steve has been writing about southern Utah redrock country for more than forty years. He has taught writing at the University of Utah, and his most recent book (his 25th) is The Capitol Reef Reader. He serves on the board of Grand Staircase Escalante Partners. For more, see www.stephentrимble.net

The prompt: “What does Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument mean?” Your answer, in a 700-word essay, can explore your personal passion for the place—what does the monument mean to you? Or perhaps you’ll choose to write about the value of public lands; the political controversy swirling around the monument that gives it national significance; or the land’s importance to Native people. Really, anything can work that makes Grand Staircase meaningful to you or to the world. We’ll have a special award for the best work from a writer 22 years and younger.

Encore Presentation! Master Class in Astrophotography with Dave Lane (2020)

Nighttime photography done well is a tricky endeavor. Learn from a master the techniques and equipment needed to produce stunning nighttime landscape images that include a dazzling starry night sky. Featured in [Time Magazine](#), the self-described unabashed astro-nut [David Lane](#) ranks among the top 5 astrophotographers in the world. Eleven of his mesmerizing images are archived on NASA’s informative website, Astronomy Picture of the Day. <https://apod.nasa.gov> Pictures: [An Airglow Fan from Lake to Sky](#), [The Milky Way Over the Arizona Toadstools](#), and [Milky Way over Devils Tower](#).

For about 2 weeks each month from April to September, Dave combs the Western U.S. looking for clear skies and great foregrounds. In a typical ten-day trip he will travel over 6,000 miles searching for that absolute epic shot! See Dave’s work on display at [Raven’s Heart Gallery](#) in Kanab.

Using numerous examples of his work, Dave will teach you the techniques and equipment required to capture telescopic deep space images and how some of that technique crosses over to Milky Way landscape images. Bring your curiosity and questions about camera equipment, use of telescopes choosing subject matter, optimum sky conditions and more, and take home the knowledge you’ll need to shoot your very own images!
